

...and NOW

Constructed as a realty office for Harlan Fairbanks during Tustin's building boom of the 1880s, it became the drug store of Dr. Levi Fuller. In 1920, the building was purchased for McCoy's Sheet Metal Works, and is now the home of Old Town Flooring. It still looks pretty good for its age.

A Tale of Courage, Determination and Love



You won't want to miss our February 17th Program and its wonderful speaker! In his most recent book, *Lizzi & Fredl: A Perilous Journey of Love and Faith*, author Dr. William B. Stanford has chronicled the story of his parents' escape from beneath Hitler's shadow in Austria, their harrowing flight to safety, and the courage, faith and love that enabled them to endure.

Dr. Stanford arrived in New York in 1950 at the age of four. Curious about his family's history, he was able to discover little because of his parents' reluctance to speak of the Nazi concentration camps, or of their experience there. He continued to gently probe over the years until the story unfolded, however. Once it did, he realized theirs was a tale worth

telling, recognizing that, while many stories have emerged from the Holocaust, there are few filled with such heart-stopping twists and turns, and even fewer with such a happy ending. We feel privileged to have Dr. Stanford with us to talk about the book and his parents' incredible journey. He will also be available to autograph his work.

1915 Rules for Women Teachers

Teachers have always faced many challenges in their chosen profession. The following list of Rules for Teachers, on display at the Old Sacramento Schoolhouse Museum, shows that yesterday's teacher might not have had many of today's challenges, but she certainly experienced challenges of a different nature.

1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.
2. You are not to keep company with men.
3. You must be home between the hours of 8pm and 6am. unless attending a school function.
4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream parlors.
5. You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
8. You may not dress in bright colors.
9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.
10. You must wear at least two petticoats.
11. Your dress may not be any shorter than two inches above your ankle.
12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once a day, scrub the floor at least once a week with hot soapy water, clean the blackboards at least once a day, and start the fire at 7am so the room will be warm by 8am.

Who Are These People *and Why Are They Here?*

This is the husband/wife team of Nancy Tschiderer and Mark Adamson, and they're very important people to our Museum. They have been in our midst since September, committed to the task of transferring our collection of historic photo negatives, O.C. citrus crate labels, and other ephemera to computer files, where they will be preserved indefinitely. They come to us courtesy of a project at the new Katie Wheeler Library in Irvine, where they have been cataloging and preserving historic images of the Irvine Ranch, and in the process they reached out to our Museum for additional photos. Now they're taking us, along with other resources, county-wide, by incorporating 371 of our photos into the

permanent files of the Orange County Public Library.

Nancy, with a Masters in Library Science, arrived at the Katie Wheeler Library by way of the Sherman Historic Research Library in Costa Mesa and UCI. Her husband, Mark, claims he was just "dragged along" but finds the research fascinating. "It's like a box of Cracker Jacks. There's a surprise in every container." The Museum is thankful for their expertise.
