Reminiscing from the Barber Shop

Remembering Old Town Tustin over the last 51 years, Gordon Bean has many stories to tell about the old timers coming into his barber shop. There is always a lot of conversation in a barber shop. Families have come to the Wooden Indian to have their hair cuts over the last 32 years. It is one of the oldest barber shops in Old Town Tustin. Gordon came from Riverside County to Tustin in 1957 where he became a full time barber until 1971. Then he went to work as a school custodian for the Tustin Unified School District full time, and spent part time as a barber. He retired from the Tustin Unified School District after 26 years at Columbus Tustin, Guin Foss, Veeh, Mildred Morrow and Nelson Schools. Then back to full time barbering at the Wooden Indian, where he has watched children grow to adults and his old customers are old friends now.

Gordon was born in 1931 on his father's ranch in Temescal Canyon, located at the base of Saddleback Mountain's east side. When he was six years old, his family moved to Elsinore, Riverside and to Corona where his father developed land on into Orange County. Three of his four children have graduated from Tustin High School.

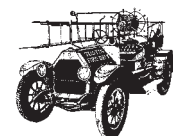

Katie Wheeler Library

The Katie Wheeler Branch Library was dedicated on Saturday, February 23, 2008 at 13109 Old Myford Road, the northeast corner near the intersection of Jamboree and Irvine Blvd. The library, named after Katie Wheeler, granddaughter of James Irvine, is located at the site of the original Irvine family ranch home, which was gutted by fire in 1965. The library was carefully designed to replicate a historic residence.

Originally constructed by C.E. French in 1876, James Irvine II nearly doubled its size in 1892. Following the 1906 San Francisco earthquake, Irvine moved his wife and three children permanently to the ranch. Through the use of old photographs and architectural drawings, the house was restored with help from the Irvine Foundation (through the Orange County Community Foundation); the City of Irvine; the Orange County Public Library; the county's Harbors, Beaches and Parks Department; and the Orange County Historical Commission.
